COP21 kicks off in Paris with 147 world leaders

The COP21 United Nations climate summit began in Paris on Monday and nearly 200 countries and their leaders have assembled. US President Barack Obama said the summit could be a turning point in international efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and prevent catastrophic levels of global warming.

Leaders Opening event

150 heads of states gathered for the opening. Normally the heads of states meet in the last week of COP but this time, as negotiations are at a crucial stage, the French hosts had arranged to pull them all for the opening of COP. The heads of states were given three minutes each to speak, but as they were so many, they ran two parallel streams. Juan Mulling was accredited by the youth constituency, YONGO, to access the restricted area to listen to the speeches. The rest of the Brahma Kumaris delegation were



listening via big screens. Sister Jayanti was able to be in the restricted area for President Obama's address. He spoke for about 7 minutes and ignored the bell chiming to tell him he was over-time.

Faith based engagement in the climate crisis

Multifaith event, IUCN Pavilion

The meeting was opened by The International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Director General, Inger Andersen. IUCN is an international organization working in the field of nature conser-vation and sustainable use of natural resources. It is involved in data gathering and analysis, research, field projects, advocacy, lobbying and education. It membership is about 1200 governmental and non-governmental organizations. She said the first item to be taken up in the meeting is faith and how faith will guide us in our environmental stewardship. Climate change is



hitting the poorest and the weakest. This makes it an ethical and moral issue. It is part of the ongoing story of injustice and inequality in the world today. Protection and preserving nature is part of protecting lives in the future.



Sister Jayanti spoke first. She said we need to go beyond limited consciousness then we can see the world, the whole planet, as our home.

When I have lost respect for myself inside, I lose respect for the outside also. Looking from the inside out:

- Richness inside comes from a life of simplicity.
- Emptiness comes from the spirit of taking,

The spiritual crisis in the world today is reflected in the humanitarian and climate crisis of our world. If we resolve the spiritual

crisis, we can resolve the problems in the world.

Olav Fykse Tveit, general secretary of the World Council of Churches, said that the roles of leaders and religious teachers have been exchanged. This morning 150 state leaders have addressed COP21, and they are speaking like priests. They talk about a moment of truth, about hope, to be together as a global family etc. There is a real transformative power in this world, we are all called to do what can. People of the world have the right to hope. We know what is wrong but we need to focus on what is right and then go in that direction. This is a most auspicious moment in human history.

'How shall we learn from the past?

The Brahma Kumaris delegation attended the first of the many 'Place to Be' events. These events held each evening and are presented as a live talk-show. They are intended to share the latest insights regarding COP21.

Founder Anne-Sophie Novel welcomed three international speakers to discuss the meaning of progress and to understand 'Transition' and 'Transformation.' Speakers included (left to right):

- John D Liu, Award winning documentary film maker
- Barbara Glowczewski, National Scientific Research Centre (France), CNRS
- Rob Hopkin, Founder of Transition Network

Anne-Sophie suggested the idea that, as a collective, we need to change the language we use when discussing climate negotiations. If we want to bring about environmental justice then we need to stop using words such as 'binding deal' that don't reflect hope for the civil society.

Main insights on the panel's view regarding 'Transition' and 'Transformation':

The key for transformation is to change the system. We need to focus on being trans-national. That is; reaching beyond national boundaries and learning how to share. It is about changing the human consciousness to understand how systems work.

We are now at a crucial moment in human history where the window of opportunity is small and so we need a trust economy: an economy that values nature more than it values things. We need to put a value on our natural ecosystem. John Liu said 'it is ridiculous to value derivatives and then to devalue real things'.

Host Anne-Sophie asked the question: How do we assign value?

Everyone agreed that it is by sharing stories of the past and inspiring people to know that we can assign value.

Rob mentioned the need to 'be' there for people after 'collapsing their view'. He spoke of 'Inner Transition,' a subgroup exploring the inner dimensions of the transition process.
